

1. ISP's in Turkey has an association called

"All Internet Association", T.I.D. ("Tüm İnternet Derneği") <http://www/tid.org.tr> which includes ISP, software and hardware companies, content provider and ASP (Application Service Provider) companies.

2. Not yet.

3. Not applicable. There has been some attempts to define some codes of ethics at Internet Council (an advisory body at the Ministry of Transportation).

4. Turkish legal system is, essentially, not modified for internet related issues yet. Although there were some attempts, like addition of an article to Press Code for protection of individual rights and privacy. General rules in legal system can be applied to harmful and illegal contents.

5. Not yet. There is no regulation concerning ISP responsibilities.

6. Not yet. Internet Council, published a declaration regulating harmful content, establishment of hot-line account and a co-regulation body. But, it has not entered into force yet.

7. It is estimated that most of it is hosted outside of Turkey and under phony names.

8. Some ISP's introduced filtering software. During "Internet Fiesta Meeting" and "Internet Conference", which are held every year, there have been panels on public education and experience sharing. Those measures did not yield effective results in all relevant fields.

13. It is observed that there is common belief among some people, especially parents, that Internet is used in a "wrong way", which includes access to illegal and harmful content. But such beliefs did not slow down the development of Internet in Turkey
