BACKGROUND

- Greece applied for EGF support to assist 206 displaced workers in the economic sector classified under NACE Revision 2 division 27 (Manufacture of electrical equipment).
- The producers of household appliances in Greece faced difficulties, including the shortages in domestic supply of electrical components and increasing productions costs, along with the need of digital transformation and automation to better compete in the global market.
- The redundancies resulted due to combination of factors. Firstly, the largest number of job losses (166 displacements) occurred because of the decision to close Pitsos' production department and to move its production to Turkey, where the costs of the production are lower.
- With regard to the redundancies in 5 other enterprises, Greece argued that the producers has fallen behind digital and technological transformation. In addition, the workforce was lacking behind the skills to adapt to the rapidly transforming digital economy. This has led to a loss of competiveness and to a certain job losses.
- The displaced workers will face difficulties of reemployment as most of them (81%) possessed lower secondary education or less. Moreover, almost a quarter (24.1%) of Attica population are at risk of poverty and social exclusion.
- The measures offered will increase their chances of finding a job on the open labour market, or support those who want to start their own business.
